#### CALL TO ORDER / INVOCATION / PLEDGE - Chair Pamn Henderson

Chair Henderson called the meeting to order.

#### **APPROVAL OF AGENDA**

Commissioner Moore asked to add a discussion regarding administrative support to the TPO. Bay County Commissioners provided a signed resolution from the county commissioners in support of this discussion.

Commissioner Griggs stated that he needed more time to review the information before discussing it today. After a consensus from the board, Commissioner Moore withdrew his motion and stated that he would bring it back at the August meeting to give board members more time to review the information.

Commissioner Carroll moved to approve the agenda. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Moore, and it was unanimously approved.

#### **PUBLIC FORUM:**

Rich Walker discussed his concerns regarding the SR 390 widening project, stating that the project has not been a priority and has taken years to be completed. Rich Walker stated that the project cuts the City of Lynn Haven in half and encouraged the board to make the SR 390 improvement project a higher construction priority and to stop putting new projects in front of it. Rich Walker asked the board when the project will be completed.

Janet Walker also discussed her concerns about the lack of progress on the SR 390 project and asked about the updated timelines on three projects. Janet Walker asked for updated information on CR 389 from SR 77 to the intersection of SR 390 and referenced the TPO's 2030 plan that stated that specific route would be widened to four lanes. Janet Walker asked if that window for construction is happening soon and when construction would continue past SR 77 and continue to the intersection of SR 390 and CR 389. Janet Walker also inquired about East 26<sup>th</sup> Street in Lynn Haven and when it is going to be joined to 26<sup>th</sup> Street on the west side.

Bryant Paulk stated that he would bring the Walkers' comments and questions to FDOT and would coordinate with ECRC staff on the responses.

Bernie Thompson asked the board not to approve of the GTC minutes or the draft bill language for the GTC item, informing the board that he made several public records requests and that not all his questions were mentioned in the minutes. Bernie Thompson requested the names of the task force that advised the GTC, and asked about the task force findings, the taxing authority, property rights and special districts. Bernie Thompson stated that he did not receive any of these items and just received a list of names of people on the task force.

Bernie Thompson encouraged the board to look at section five and the statement that this bill would give the GTC a wide range of powers to include acquisition of private property and to charge fees to citizens if it meets broad ideas of public purposes. The GTC minutes have been updated to reflect Bernie Thompsons comments.

## FDOT UPDATE: FDOT Update - Bryant Paulk, AICP Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Urban Liaisons

Bryant Paulk reported that the US 231 at Star Ave/Titus Rd realignment project is scheduled for a February 2025 letting. The current construction estimate for this project is \$21million. The increase in the project estimate has generated the need for an LRTP amendment and FDOT will be sending a request to the TPO for this update.

Bryant Paulk stated that the DuPont Bridge replacement project was let in May of this year. This was a \$350 million design/build contract awarded to Scott Bridge Co. Bryant Paulk stated that once contract time and other details are finalized FDOT will update the TPO.

Bryant Paulk reported there would be a public meeting for the SR20 from SR79 to US231 PD&E study on July 23<sup>rd</sup> at the Sand Hills Assembly of God Church. The church is located at 14032 Hwy 77 Southport, FL. The meeting is scheduled from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Chair Henderson stated that she spoke with Brian Pettis at FDOT about the letter the TPO sent to FDOT in April regarding the request for signage on the Thomas Drive Bridge; a work

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order to install signage on the Thomas Drive flyover for eastbound traffic that warns drivers that the right lane is ending. Chair Henderson stated that they also discussed the MLK study and said its constructed with a restrictive median with various directional and full median openings. The restrictive median reduces overall conflicts between all roadway users, vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians and promotes the efficient and safe movement of people and goods. FDOT inquired that the Bay TPO board find out any specific intersection generating concern and FDOT would take the information and do a thorough evaluation. Commissioner Lucas stated that she would have to ask city staff for specific addresses. Chair Henderson stated that if Commissioner Lucas would provide any specific intersections, she would include her, Bryant Paulk and Brian Pettis on an email for follow up.

Commissioner Griggs asked if the US 231 at Atar Avenue/ Titus Road intersection project was included in the section of US 231 that is starting in February 2025 or is that just the widening of SR 231. Bryant Paulk stated that it is just the widening of SR 231, and that the realignment was basically pulled out of the SR 231 capacity projects but will be improved from a safety standpoint during the widening.

## 2. ENCLOSURE C - ALL COMMITTEES Consideration of Resolution BAY 24-14 Adopting the Bay FY 2026-2030 Project Priorities - *Gary Kramer, ECRC Staff*

Gary Kramer presented the Bay County TPO FY 2026-2030 Project Priorities. Leandra Meredith presented the public involvement section of the project and presented survey results. Commissioner Griggs stated that ECRC staff gave a presentation to the planning board, and it really helped the group understand what the TPO board does and how the Priorities work.

Commissioner Street asked if the additional phasing (Phase Six), from MLK Boulevard along 11<sup>th</sup> Street to East Avenue and next to the Lynn Haven Rail Trail was included in this presented priority list. Gary Kramer stated that it can be added at the pleasure of the board.

Commissioner Dozier stated that he would be happy to stay after the meeting with Bryant Paulk to help answer the Walkers' questions regarding the completion date of SR 390 through Lynn Haven.

Commissioner Moore moved to authorize the TPO chair to sign Resolution Bay 24-14 adopting the FY 2026-2030 Project Priorities with the extension on the Panama City Sun Trail Program - Phase 6. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dozier and the motion passed unanimously.

3. ENCLOSURE D- ALL COMMITTEES – Election of TPO and Advisory Committee Chair and Vice Chair for FY 2025 (July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025)

The board chose to keep the chair and vice chair the same. Mary Beth Washnock stated that the TCC elected Eddie Cook as Chair and Keith Bryant and Vice Chair and that the CAC elected Ali Frohlich as chair and James Pretlow as Vice Chair.

Commissioner Dozier moved to elect Pamn Henderson as TPO Chair and Robert Carroll as TPO Vice Chair for FY 2025. The motion was seconded by Council Member Coburn and was passed unanimously.

Lindsay Slautterback gave an update on the Emerald Coast Safety Action plan for the Safe Streets for All Grant. Jared Schneider informed the board that as a recipient of an SS4A grant, ECRC will produce a Safety Action Plan. The Safety Action Plan will assist the ECRC and the TPO regions in achieving the target of zero fatalities and serious injuries.

1. TRANSIT ACTION ITEMS: ENCLOSURE H – TPO ONLY – Nomination of Transit Sub-Committee Member – *Mary Beth Washnock, ECRC Staff* 

Mary Beth Washnock stated that following the April TPO meeting, staff received documentation from the City of Panama City Beach that Councilman Michael Jarman has been replaced on the TPO, thus creating a vacancy on the Transit Subcommittee and GTC. To maintain five seats on the Transit Subcommittee/GTC, Lamar Hobbs asked the TPO to appoint a replacement.

Commissioner Carroll moved to appoint Mary Coburn to the Bay County TPO Transit Subcommittee/Governance Transit Committee. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dozier and was passed unanimously.

 ENCLOSURE I - TPO ONLY - Consideration of Resolution Bay 24-16 Approving Draft Bill Language for Proceeding with the Necessary Legislative Process for Creation of a New Independent Transit Authority - Ashley Stukey, Bay County BOCC

Ashley Stukey informed the board that on June 3, 2024, the GTC met to consider recommending to the TPO and BOCC that the updated draft bill language be resubmitted to the Office of Bill Drafting Services for consideration and inclusion in the FY2025 Florida Legislative Session.

Ashley Stuckey stated that one of the sections that has been changed refers to the transit authority board itself and its membership. Previously, the county, the cities, and the TPO were required to select elected officials as its members. The new version states that the selected member does not have to be an elected official.

Ashley Stuckey stated that a citizen voiced concern over the non-ad valorem special assessment and that before the bill was submitted, all ad valorem taxation powers were taken out of this new version of the bill.

Ashley Stuckey stated that there was also discussion about the additional fees charged in section five and explained that they are no more than the powers the TPO and Bay BOCC have now. If this board was to be created, it would need to have the power to levy charges and fees.

Chair Henderson stated that she spoke to Representative Griffits about the House bill and reasons it did not make it to committee. Representative Griffits shared that some of the language in the bill didn't sit well with everybody. An example being the term

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"independent special district". Chair Henderson stated that Representative Griffits recommended tweaking the language of the bill before submitting again.

Mary Coburn asked about the language in Section 5D that states the GTC can collect fines from persons or property or vote for the provision and use of services. Lamar Hobbs stated that the county does not have fining authority, so he was not aware why that language was included. Ashley Stuckey stated that they would re-evaluate that language.

Ashley Stuckey stated that County staff can go back through the language and have it brought back at the August Bay TPO meeting to be voted on before it is taken to the Bay County BOCC. No action was taken.

#### **SCOPE OF WORK**

#### **BACKGROUND**

A network of complete streets improves the safety, convenience, efficiency, and accessibility of the transportation system for all users. The TPO has a history of planning for complete streets that dates back well before the creation and popularity of the term. The 2011 Bicycle Pedestrian Plan centered on identifying potential bicycle and pedestrian facility improvements and prioritizing them for future construction. The 2011 Bicycle Pedestrian Plan was amended in 2013 to add four (4) additional projects. In addition, the Florida Department of Transportation adopted the Complete Streets policy in September 2014, which promotes safety, quality of life, and economic development in Florida. The 2011 Bicycle Pedestrian Plan and 2013 amendment continue to be utilized for the inclusion of bike/ped projects in the LRTP. The plan provided beneficial projects that have made their way to construction. Since the last update, the local governments have made progress towards the development of bike/friendly ped-friendly communities. Thus, to capture all local efforts made, provide an updated priority list, and create a trail master plan focused on the SUN trail and the Florida Greenways and Trails Priority Network, a Bicycle, Pedestrian & Trail Master Plan major revision is necessary.

#### INTENT

Given the emphasis on bicycle, pedestrian, and trail improvements as well as the addition of the Complete Streets policy, the TPO will undertake an effort to incorporate the improvements and Complete Streets policy into an updated Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Trail Master Plan. The goal of this major plan update is to develop a non-motorized system that addresses the needs of all users and encourages the use of alternative modes of transportation. By providing alternate modes of transportation, citizens benefit not only from their physical health but also from increased prosperity for themselves and the community. The purpose and goal of the Bay TPO Bicycle, Pedestrian, & Trail Master Plan is to:

- A. Develop a shared vision for all communities.
- B. Promote active transportation, enhancing safety, and improving connectivity.
- C. Set specific goals, such as increasing Bicycle, Pedestrian, Trail infrastructure, promoting health, and reducing traffic congestion.
- D. Develop strategies that support the integration of safe and well-connected pedestrian and bicycle networks into the overall transportation system.
- E. Identify and prioritize Bicycle and Pedestrian Projects, as well as Trail projects included on the SUN Trail network and the Florida Greenways and Trails Priority network.

#### Task 1: Project Administration and Coordination

A. ECRC and CONSULTANT will develop a project schedule that includes project meetings, bi-weekly or as-needed coordination meetings, a timeline of deliverables, and schedule coordination with the Bay County Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Project. Also, this project will coordinate and use data from the SS4A Safety Plan and other relevant data from the SS4A Project. This will enable progress toward reaching the community vision. The objectives will be system and performance-oriented and will provide quantitative direction towards the attainment of goals.

- E. The plan will be conducted in a collaborative atmosphere, with public participation integrated into the process of technical evaluation and prioritization. The plan will incorporate the following civic engagement efforts: THE CONSULTANT will present up to three (3) Regional Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee Meetings, up to three (3) Local Working Group Meetings, present during two (2) TPO and TPO Advisory Committee Meetings. These meetings may be held in person, virtual or hybrid.
- **F. Existing Regional Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee:** The Regional Bicycle Pedestrian and Advisory Committee will be utilized to assist in the development of Regional Goals and Objectives, guide the plan from a regional perspective, and will be responsible for reviewing and providing comments on key deliverables providing input on plan recommendations. The existing Regional Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee is anticipated to hold up to **three (3) meetings**, which may be in person, virtual, or hybrid.
- **G. The Local Working Group:** may include representatives from the TPO and Advisory committees, university and school officials, students, recreational pedestrian and trail and bicycling organizations, law enforcement, citizens, design professionals, and other groups as determined. It is anticipated the Local Working Group will hold up to **three (3) meetings** which may be in person, virtual, or hybrid.

Of concern was the "what/when/how" the ECRC Board investigated the event, what they decided to do or not do as a result of any findings, and the lack of reporting back to members of the Bay County TPO of those results.
- 3) Summary of the mandatory regulatory role that Regional Planning Councils (RPC) play as a matter of statutory authority. Almost everything the RPCs do, including ECRC, are a matter of interlocal agreement rather than statutory obligation. That includes its role in staffing the TPOs.

General Concerns and RPC responsibilities

1) The costs of recently held events that were put on by ECRC were extravagant. In February 2024, an evening event was held in connection with ECRC/TPO Board Workshop & Training and MPOAC Institute. The costs for this particular event were much larger than similar events in the past. In particular, certain items such as the procurement of an event planner and bringing in entertainment from long distances were of significant cost.

ECRC Response: The event mentioned above was an ECRC sponsored event held February 1st, 2nd and  $3^{rd}$  and stretched over the three-day period. There were several workshops, meetings, and sessions designed for board members to attend and benefit from. The Bay TPO did not pay for anything associated, related, or directly for the evening, the entertainment, or the event planner mentioned above, nor did any local government. Total charges to the Bay TPO were only \$502.30 which were directly associated with the MPOAC weekend institute training. This amount represents a massive savings to the TPO as sending only one board member to an MPOAC training costs on average \$750 and typically we send 3 or 6 per year. FDOT has reviewed all costs associated with the TPO charges with no issues. FHWA has reviewed all costs associated with federal funds with no issues. ECRC board has reviewed all costs associated with this event and found no wrong doing.

- 2) Communications from the ECRC Board. As a result of the prior event above, the ECRC Board looked into the costs of the event and procurement used to acquire the above services. There were multiple ECRC Executive committee meetings, as well as, ECRC Board meetings to discuss the event. While the ECRC did look into the event and its costs, communications with the various boards that make up the Bay County TPO was not readily available. Of concern was the "what/when/how" the ECRC Board investigated the event, what they decided to do or not do as a result of any findings, and the lack of reporting back to members of the Bay County TPO of those results. ECRC Response: Again, being highly conscientious of TPO funds, ECRC only used \$502.30 of TPO funds that went directly to the MPOAC training in which the Bay TPO board members were invited and attended. We typically do not seek additional approval or input for expenditures this small when they've already been approved in the operating budgets.

ECRC Response: Items a through d have all been removed from RPC responsibilities via Florida Statutes during Rick Scotts time as Florida Governor. For the past seven or eight years, there are no requirements for RPCs to review comp plans/amendments or old DRIs. Item e, the ECRC does have several written agreements with the TPO that outline the activities and functions of the TPO/ECRC roles.

**ORIGIN OF SUBJECT**: Bay County Governance Transit Committee (GTC)

**LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION NEEDED**: Bay County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) Approval

**BACKGROUND**: On February 1, 2023, the Bay County Transportation Planning Organization and the Bay County BOCC entered an interlocal agreement for creation of the Bay County Governance Transit Committee (GTC). The GTC operated as a county-wide transit policy committee, under the direction of the TPO and BOCC, to oversee preparation and evaluation of the Bay County Transit Governance Analysis (Governance Analysis) and to provide a forum to discuss the Governance Analysis.

Beginning with the June 13, 2023 GTC meeting, Bay County staff, intergovernmental affairs representatives, and consultants worked together to form a working group to conduct the necessary steps for drafting a legislative bill for inclusion in the FY2024 legislative session. Unfortunately, the Transit Authority bill did not move through the legislative process as the climate for adding independent special districts was not favorable at that time.

On June 3, 2024, the GTC met to consider recommending to the TPO and BOCC that the updated draft bill language be resubmitted to the Bay County Local Delegation for consideration and inclusion in the FY2025 Florida Legislative Session.

On June 26, 2024, the GTC recommendation was presented to the entire TPO Board for approval. After conversation among TPO members there were suggestions for changes to the recommended bill language. Those changes have been made to the updated draft bill language for TPO consideration and approval.

22	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
23	
24	Section 1. DefinitionsAs used in this act, unless
25	otherwise specified:

- 26 (1) "Authority" means the Gulf Coast Transit Authority.
- 27 (2) "Bay County TPO" means the entity established by
- 28 interlocal agreement between Bay County and the municipalities
- 29 located within the county dated February 25, 2015, pursuant to
- 30 section 163.01, Florida Statutes.
- 31 (3) "Board" and "board of directors," unless the context
- 32 clearly indicates otherwise, mean the Gulf Coast Transit
- 33 Authority Board of Directors.
- 34 (4) "County" means Bay County.
- 35 (5) "Director" means a member of the board of directors of
- 36 and for the authority.
- 37 (6) "Mass transit" means a system used for the
- 38 transportation of people and goods by means of a street railway,
- 39 an elevated railway, a commuter railroad, a subway, a motor
- 40 vehicle, a motor bus, a water transport, a ferry, and other
- 41 transportation facilities whether now or hereafter invented, and
- 42 including a complete system of tracks, stations, rolling stock,
- 43 and other facilities necessary to effectuate passenger and goods
- 44 conveyance. The term includes fixed route and demand-responsive
- 45 transit systems.
- 46 Section 2. Authority; creation; boundaries; charter
- 47 amendments. -
- 48 (1) There is hereby created an independent special
- 49 district for purposes of providing mass transit services to the
- 50 citizens of Bay County, incorporating lands in Bay County

- 51 described in subsection (2), which shall be a public corporation
- 52 having the powers, duties, rights, obligations, and immunities
- 53 herein set forth, under the name of the Gulf Coast Transit
- 54 Authority. The authority is organized and exists for the
- 55 purposes and shall hold all powers set forth in this act and
- 56 chapter 189, Florida Statutes, unless expressly prohibited under this
- 57 Act.
- 58 (2) The lands to be included within the authority are all
- 59 lands in Bay County, whether incorporated or unincorporated.
- 60 (3) The authority's charter may be amended only by special
- 61 act of the Legislature.
- 62 Section 3. Purpose. -
- 63 (1) The purpose of the authority shall be to plan,
- 64 finance, acquire, construct, operate, and maintain mass transit
- 65 facilities and systems, together with such supplementary
- 66 transportation assistance as may be necessary or advisable to
- 67 service the mass transit needs within the territorial boundaries
- 68 of the authority and of such areas with which the authority may
- 69 contract for service.
- 70 (2) The purpose of the authority shall also be to provide
- 71 for the consolidation of transit services in Bay County and to
- 72 provide for the transition to a countywide transit system.
- 73 Section 4. Governing board; quorum; creation; employment
- 74 of personnel; compensation; organization; commissioners' bond. -
- 75 (1) The business and affairs of the authority shall be

- 76 conducted and administered by a board of seven voting directors,
- 77 and the presence of a majority of board members shall constitute
- 78 a quorum for official business.
- 79 (a) The board shall consist of the following members:
- 1. The Board of County Commissioners of Bay County shall
- 81 appoint two members of the board.
- 2. The City Council of the City of Panama City Beach shall
- 83 appoint one member of the board.
- 3. The City Commission of the City of Panama City shall
- 85 appoint one member of the board.
- 4. The City Commission of the City of Lynn Haven shall
- 87 appoint one member of the board.
- 88 5. The City Commission of the City of Callaway shall
- 89 appoint one member of the board.
- 90 6. The Board of the Bay County TPO shall appoint one member of the
- 91 board.

- 93 All members shall be initially appointed by their respective
- 94 boards for 2-year terms. Appointees other than the TPO appointee may
- 95 serve consecutive terms if the appointing authority so elects.
- 96 Appointees may be, but are not required to be, elected members of the
- 97 appointing authority.
- 98 (b) In order to facilitate the consolidation of transit
- 99 services in Bay County, arrange for initial funding of the
- 100 authority, and transition to a countywide transit system, the

- 101 board may rely on Bay County Transit staff, the Governance
- 102 Transit Committee of the Bay County TPO, and the appropriate
- 103 staff of the Bay County TPO to provide support, policy
- 104 recommendations, and strategic planning as requested.
- 105 (2) The board may employ an executive director and
- 106 authorize such other personnel as it deems necessary for the
- 107 proper function and operation of the authority. The salaries of
- 108 authority personnel, and any other wages, shall be determined by
- 109 the board.
- 110 (3) Each appointed member of the board shall assume office
- 111 10 days following the member's appointment. Annually, within 60
- 112 days after the appointment of new members of said board, the
- 113 members shall organize by electing from their number a chair, a
- 114 vice chair, a secretary, and a treasurer. However, the same
- 115 member may be both secretary and treasurer.
- 116 (4) The directors shall receive payment for actual
- 117 expenses incurred while performing the duties of their office in
- 118 accordance with general law governing per diem for public
- 119 officials. Directors may not receive compensation for their
- 120 services.
- 121 (5) Each director, upon taking office and in accordance
- 122 with chapter 189, Florida Statutes, shall execute to the
- 123 Governor for the benefit of the authority a bond conditioned
- 124 upon the faithful performance of the duties of the director's
- 125 office. The premium for such bonds shall be paid from the funds

- 126 of the authority.
- 127 Section 5. Powers; functions; and duties. -
- 128 (1) The authority shall have all powers to carry out the
- 129 purposes of this act and the functions and duties provided for
- 130 herein, including the following powers, which shall be in
- 131 addition to and supplement any other privileges, benefits, and
- 132 powers granted by this act or general law:
- 133 (a) To adopt bylaws for the regulation of the affairs and
- 134 the conduct of the business of the authority. The bylaws shall
- 135 provide for quorum and voting requirements, maintenance of
- 136 minutes and other official records, and preparation and adoption
- 137 of an annual budget.
- 138 (b) To study, plan, design, establish, acquire, construct,
- 139 own, lease, operate, manage, maintain, dispose of, improve, and
- 140 expand the mass transit facilities and services within the
- 141 boundaries of the authority.
- 142 (c) To execute all contracts and other documents, adopt
- 143 all proceedings, and perform all acts determined by the board as
- 144 necessary or advisable to carry out the purposes of this act.
- 145 The chair, vice chair, or executive director shall execute
- 146 contracts and other documentation on behalf of the authority.
- 147 (d) To fix, alter, levy, collect, and enforce rates,
- 148 fares, fees, charges, and penalties from violations of rules
- 149 established by the Authority, for the provision and use of services,
- 150 facilities, and products of the authority or to pay the

- 151 operating or financing costs of the authority's facilities and
- 152 services that are available to potential users.
- 153 (e) To contract for the service of engineers, accountants,
- 154 attorneys, and other experts or consultants and such other
- 155 agents as the board may require or deem appropriate from time to
- 156 time.
- 157 (f) To acquire such lands and rights and interests
- 158 herein; to acquire such personal property as the authority may
- 159 deem necessary and appropriate in connection with the
- 160 acquisition, ownership, expansion, improvement, operation, and
- 161 maintenance of the authority's facilities; and to hold and
- 162 dispose of all real and personal property under its control. Except
- that the Authority shall not have the power of eminent domain to
- acquire property for public transportation facilities.
- 165 (q) To lease or rent any of its easements, real property
- 166 interests, or facilities to other mass transit providers that
- 167 are owned by a municipality, county, or special district, that
- 168 hold a franchise from a municipality or county, when such lease
- 169 or rental is for joint use by the authority and the other
- 170 provider.
- 171 (h) To exercise exclusive jurisdiction, control, and
- 172 supervision over the authority's services and facilities and to
- 173 make and enforce such rules and regulations for the maintenance,
- 174 management, and operation of the authority and its facilities
- 175 and services as may be, in the judgment of the board, necessary

- 176 or desirable for the efficient operation of the authority in
- 177 accomplishing the purposes of this act.
- 178 (i) To enter into interlocal agreements or join with any
- 179 other general or special purpose local governments, public
- 180 agencies, or authorities in the exercise of common powers.
- 181 (j) To accomplish construction directly or by letting
- 182 contracts to other entities, whether public or private, for all
- 183 or any part of the construction of improvements to the
- 184 authority's facilities as determined by the board in accordance
- 185 with applicable law.
- 186 (k) To apply for and accept grants, loans, and subsidies
- 187 from any governmental entity for the acquisition, construction,
- 188 operation, and maintenance of the authority's facilities and
- 189 services and to comply with all requirements and conditions
- 190 imposed in connection therewith.
- 191 (1) To receive and accept from any federal, state, or
- 192 local sources grants, loans, or contributions for or in the aid
- 193 of the planning, construction, reconstruction, operation,
- 194 promotion, or financing of the authority's facilities or
- 195 services and to receive and accept aid, contributions, or loans
- 196 from any other source of money, labor, or other things of value,
- 197 to be held, used, and applied only for the purpose for which the
- 198 grants, contributions, or loans may be made.
- 199 (m) To adopt a budget in accordance with applicable law
- 200 and to appropriate and expend revenue in accordance with that

- 201 budget.
- 202 (n) To purchase or assume ownership, lease, operation,
- 203 management, or control of any publicly or privately-owned mass
- 204 transit facilities, including the assumption, defeasance, or
- 205 payment of the financial liabilities associated with such
- 206 facilities.
- 207 (o) To divide the authority facilities into separate
- 208 units, benefit areas, or subsystems for the purpose of setting rates,
- 209 fees, or charges; for accounting or financing improvements or
- 210 additions; or for any other purpose.
- 211 (p) To appoint advisory boards and committees to assist
- 212 the board in the exercise and performance of the powers and
- 213 duties provided in this act.
- 214 (q) To sue and be sued in the name of the authority and to
- 215 participate as a party in any civil, administrative, or other
- 216 action.
- 217 (r) To adopt and use a seal and authorize the use of a
- 218 facsimile thereof.
- 219 (s) To employ or contract with any public entity or person
- 220 to manage and operate the authority and its facilities, or any
- 221 portion thereof, upon such terms as the board deems appropriate.
- (t) Subject to such provisions and restrictions as may be
- 223 set forth in any financing documents, to sell or otherwise
- 224 dispose of the authority's facilities, or any portion thereof,
- 225 upon such terms as the board deems appropriate, and to enter

- 226 into acquisition or other agreements to affect such
- 227 dispositions.
- 228 (u) To acquire by purchase, gift, devise, or otherwise,
- 229 and to dispose of, real or personal property or any estate
- 230 therein.
- 231 (v) To provide such deferred compensation, retirement
- 232 benefits, or other benefits and programs as the board deems
- 233 appropriate.
- 234 (w) To maintain an office or offices at such place or
- 235 places as the board may designate from time to time.
- 236 (x) To hold, control, and acquire by donation or purchase,
- 237 or to dispose of any public easements, dedications to public
- 238 use, platted reservations for public purposes, or any
- 239 reservations for those purposes authorized by this act and to
- 240 make use of such easements, dedications, and reservations for
- 241 the purposes authorized in this act.
- 242 (y) To lease, as lessor or lessee, to or from any person,
- 243 firm, corporation, association, or body, public or private,
- 244 facilities or property of any nature to carry out the purposes
- 245 authorized in this act.
- 246 (z) To borrow money and issue bonds, certificates,
- 247 warrants, notes, obligations, or other evidence of indebtedness.
- 248 (aa) To invest its money in such investments as directed
- 249 by the board in accordance with state law. Such investments
- 250 shall be consistent in all instances with the applicable

- 251 provisions of the financing documents.
- 252 (bb) To purchase such insurance as the authority deems
- 253 appropriate.
- 254 (cc) To develop transportation plans and to coordinate the
- 255 authority's planning and programs with those of appropriate
- 256 municipal, county, state, special district, and federal agencies
- 257 and other political subdivisions of the state.
- 258 (dd) To market and promote the authority and its
- 259 facilities and services.
- 260 (ee) To do all acts and to exercise all powers necessary,
- 261 convenient, incidental, implied, or proper, both within and
- 262 outside the boundaries of the authority, in connection with any
- 263 of the powers, duties, obligations, or purposes authorized by
- 264 this act, general law, or any interlocal agreement entered into
- 265 by the authority.
- 266 (ff) To prescribe and adopt necessary rules and
- 267 regulations consistent with the provisions of this act.
- 268 (2) In exercising the powers conferred by this act, the
- 269 board shall act by resolution or motion made and adopted at a
- 270 duly noticed and publicly held meetings in conformance with
- 271 applicable law.
- 272 (3) The provisions of chapter 120, Florida Statutes, shall
- 273 not apply to the authority.
- 274 (4) Nothing herein is intended to or shall be construed to
- 275 limit the power of local self-government of the county or

- 276 conflict with the Constitution of the State of Florida.
- 277 (5) The authority's planning requirements shall be as set
- 278 forth in this act and chapter 189, Florida Statutes.
- 279 (6) Requirements for financial disclosure, meeting
- 280 notices, reporting, public records maintenance, and per diem
- 281 expenses for directors, officers, and employees shall be as set
- 282 forth in this act and chapters 112, 119, 189, and 286, Florida
- 283 Statutes.
- 284 Section 6. Non-ad valorem assessments. -The authority is
- 285 authorized to levy and enforce the collection of non-ad valorem
- 286 assessments in accordance with chapters 189 and 197, Florida
- 287 Statutes. The Authority shall have no ad valorem taxing or non-ad
- 288 valorem assessment power.
- 289 Section 7. Fiscal year. —The authority's fiscal year shall
- 290 begin on October 1 and end on September 30.
- 291 Section 8. Authority funds. —All funds of the authority
- 292 shall be deposited in qualified public depositories in
- 293 accordance with chapter 280, Florida Statutes.
- Section 9. Authority to borrow money; procedures and
- 295 requirements for the issuance of bonds. -
- 296 (1) The board shall have the power and authority to borrow
- 297 money or issue other evidences of indebtedness for the purposes
- 298 of the authority in accordance with chapter 189, Florida
- 299 Statutes. The board shall by resolution authorize the issuance
- 300 of general obligation bonds payable from any lawful sources for

- construction of capital improvements or expansion purposes of
  the transit services that the authority exists to provide,
  subject to a referendum of the qualified electors of the
- 304 authority in accordance with the requirements of general law.
- 305 (2) The authority is prohibited from lending its credit to 306 corporations, associations, partnerships, or persons.
- The authority may finance or refinance the 307 acquisition, construction, expansion, and improvement of such 308 309 facilities relating to a governmental function or purpose 310 through the issuance of its bonds, notes, or other obligations under this section or as otherwise authorized by law. The 311 authority has all the powers that are necessary to finance, own, 312 operate, or manage the public facility, including, without 313 314 limitation, the power to establish rates, charges, and fees for 315 products or services provided by it; the power to sell or finance all
- products or services provided by it; the power to sell or finance all or a portion of such facility; and the power to contract with a public or private entity to manage and operate such facilities or to provide or receive facilities, services, or products.
- in connection with the authorization, issuance, and sale of bonds. The bonds may be issued as serial bonds or as term bonds or both. The authority may issue capital appreciation bonds or variable rate bonds. Any bonds, notes, or other obligations must be authorized by resolution of the authority and bear the date; mature at the time, not exceeding 40 years from their respective

326	dates; bear interest at the rate; be payable at the time; be in
327	the denomination; be in the form; carry the registration
328	privileges; be executed in the manner; be payable from the
329	sources and in the medium or payment and at the place; and be
330	subject to the terms of redemption, including redemption prior
331	to maturity, as the resolution may provide. If any officer whose
332	signature, or a facsimile of whose signature, appears on any
333	bonds, notes, or other obligations ceases to be an officer
334	before the delivery of the bonds, notes, or other obligations,
335	the signature or facsimile is valid and sufficient for all
336	purposes as if he or she had remained in office until the
337	delivery. The bonds, notes, or other obligations may be sold at
338	public or private sale for such price as the authority shall
339	determine in accordance with chapter 189, Florida Statutes.
340	Pending preparation of the definitive bonds, the authority may
341	issue interim certificates, which shall be exchanged for the
342	definitive bonds. The bonds may be secured by a form of credit
343	enhancement, if any, as the authority deems appropriate. The
344	bonds may be secured by an indenture of trust or trust
345	agreement. In addition, the authority may delegate to an
346	officer, official, or agent of the authority as the governing
347	body of the authority may select, the power to determine the
348	time; manner of sale, public or private; maturities; rate of
349	interest, which may be fixed or may vary at the time and in
350	accordance with a specified formula or method of determination;

- 351 and other terms and conditions as may be deemed appropriate by
- 352 the officer, official, or agent so designated by the governing
- 353 body of the authority. However, the amount and maturity of the
- 354 bonds, notes, or other obligations and the interest rate of the
- 355 bonds, notes, or other obligations must be within the limits
- 356 prescribed by the governing body of the authority and its
- 357 resolution delegating to an officer, official, or agent the
- 358 power to authorize the issuance and sale of the bonds, notes, or
- 359 other obligations.
- 360 (5) Bonds, notes, or other obligations issued under this
- 361 section may be validated as provided in chapter 75, Florida
- 362 Statutes.
- 363 (6) The accomplishment of the authorized purposes of the
- 364 authority is in all respects for the benefit of the people of
- 365 the state, for the increase of their commerce and prosperity,
- 366 and for the improvement of their health and living conditions.
- 367 Since the authority will perform essential governmental
- 368 functions in accomplishing its purposes, the authority is not
- 369 required to pay any taxes or assessments of any kind whatsoever
- 370 upon any property acquired or used by the authority for such
- 371 purposes or upon any revenues or other income at any time
- 372 received by the authority. The authority shall be exempt from
- 373 all taxation, licenses, fees, or other charges of any kind
- 374 imposed by the state, the county, any municipality, any
- 375 political subdivision, any taxing district, or any other public

- agency or body of the state. The bonds, notes, and other
- 377 obligations of the authority, their transfer, and the income
- 378 therefrom, including any profits made on the sale thereof, are
- 379 at all times free from taxation of any kind by the state or by
- 380 any political subdivision or other agency or instrumentality
- 381 thereof. The exemption granted in this paragraph is not
- 382 applicable to any tax imposed by chapter 220, Florida Statutes,
- 383 on interest, income, or profits on debt obligations owned by
- 384 corporations.
- Section 10. Board action; compliance with open government
- 386 laws and public records laws; authority to adopt policies and
- 387 regulations. -
- 388 (1) A record shall be kept of all meetings of the board,
- 389 and, in such meetings, a majority vote of the directors,
- 390 providing that a quorum is present, shall be necessary for any
- 391 affirmative action by the board.
- 392 (2) The board shall comply with chapter 286, Florida
- 393 Statutes, to preserve the right of the people to attend public
- 394 meetings.
- 395 (3) The board shall comply with the public records laws
- 396 set forth in chapter 119, Florida Statutes, to preserve the
- 397 right of the people to access public records.
- 398 (4) The board may adopt policies and regulations not
- inconsistent with any portion of this act or chapter 189,
- 400 Florida Statutes, as it may deem necessary for the transaction

- 401 of its business and in implementing and carrying out the
- 402 provisions of this act. The board shall have authority to
- 403 provide all things necessary for the operation of transit
- 404 services in the authority.
- Section 11. Notwithstanding any provision in this act to
- 406 the contrary, neither this act nor the creation of the authority
- 407 shall have any effect on the powers, duties, rights,
- 408 obligations, and immunities of any county, municipality, or
- 409 special district. This act is intended to comply with the
- 410 provisions of Art. VIII, Section 4, of the Florida Constitution
- 411 regarding transfer of powers.
- Section 12. In the event that any part of this act should
- 413 be held void for any reason, such holding shall not affect any
- 414 other part thereof.
- Section 13. This act shall take effect upon becoming a
- 416 law.
