CALL TO ORDER / INVOCATION / PLEDGE - Chair Pamn Henderson

Chair Henderson called the meeting to order.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

<u>Commissioner Hamm moved to approve the agenda. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Coburn, and it was unanimously approved.</u>

PUBLIC FORUM:

Jennifer Bennet spoke regarding the Bicycle and Trails Master Plan and the Governing Transit Committee (GTC) items. Jennifer Bennet stated concern about the updated plan included areas of private property and expressed her concern regarding the verbiage in the GTC legislation discussing land acquisition.

Mark McQueen, Bay County Superintendent of Schools, discussed significant safety concerns related to student safety and traffic congestion along SR 22 in the vicinity of Callaway Elementary School. Mark McQueen stated that there has been tremendous growth in both Callaway and Callaway Elementary School and that nearly 600 students now attend the school. Mark McQueen stated that as housing in the area continues to increase, the school's improved grade will undoubtedly attract additional students.

Mark McQueen stated that due to budget limitations students living within two miles of the school are no longer provided bus services. This has increased the number of parent/guardian drop offs, which has contributed greatly to the safety issues and congestion along the SR22 corridor. Mark McQueen explained that despite guidance to drop students off on school property many parents/guardians are choosing to drop their children off along

the SR22 right-of-way. In many cases this requires the student to cross the highway during this busy time of day which places an additional burden on both school employees and law enforcement as they attempt to provide a safe environment beyond the school property.

Mark McQueen stated that the Bay County School Board encourages FDOT and the TPO to consider all potential pedestrian and cyclist improvements as part of the capacity project. Improvements such as a pedestrian overpass at the school and appropriate sidewalks and bike lanes are features that would greatly increase safety for the students.

The TPO directed staff to draft a resolution addressing SR 22 in Callaway and to work with FDOT on the resolution and to send to Chair Henderson for signature to be forwarded to FDOT Secretary Gainer and to Callaway Elementary School.

FDOT UPDATE

1. FDOT Update - Mr. Bryant Paulk, AICP, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Urban Liaison

Casey Johns, FDOT planning specialist, presented the 2055 Florida Transportation Plan Update.

Chair Henderson asked for an update on the DuPont bridge contract. Bryant Paulk stated that at this time, a contract has yet to be posted. Discussion ensued regarding concerns on the estimated cost and the need for the bridge.

Angela Bradley stated that this plan will serve as a resource for the Bay County TPO and will be a major update to the TPO's current bicycle pedestrian master plan, which will include the addition of a trail element. Angela Bradley informed the board that the intent of this plan is to incorporate the improvements and Complete Streets policy into an updated Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Trail Master Plan.

<u>Commissioner Dozier moved to recommend the TPO chair sign Resolution BAY</u> <u>24-17 authorizing the ECRC/TPO to enter scope negotiations, issue a task order</u> to a GPC for the completion of a Bike/Ped/Trail plan, and adopting the 2024 Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Trail Master Plan. Councilmember Casto seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

Commissioner Moore presented the Bay County BOCC resolution expressing interest in finding alternative administrative support for the Bay County TPO. Commissioner Moore discussed the general concerns and responsibilities of ECRC and discussed his concerns with the joint TPO/MPOAC meeting held in February 2024. Commissioner Moore opened discussions from the board. Discussion ensued. The board decided to not pursue any further action and to continue with ECRC as the administrative support for the Bay TPO.

Mayor Rohan made a motion to not pursue any further action and to continue with ECRC as the administrative support for the Bay TPO. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dozier and the motion was approved with Commissioner Moore opposed.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION NEEDED: None

BACKGROUND: The Bay County TPO is the designated official planning agency for the Bay County Transportation Disadvantaged service area. According to Chapter 427.015 (2) F. S., the Metropolitan Planning Organization is the organization that "shall recommend to the commission a single community transportation coordinator.

Bay County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) was designated by the Florida Commission for Transportation Disadvantaged (CTD) as the Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC) for Bay County and has served in that capacity since 2014. Bay County (BOCC) has requested to remain the CTC for Bay County and has the experience and qualifications to serve the transportation disadvantaged population.

The Bay County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board is the advisory board (to the TPO) that is composed of representatives who help guide the CTC relative to the coordination of transportation disadvantaged services approved to recommend that Bay County BOCC remains the CTC for Bay County on November 13, 2024.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Resolution Bay 24-30 Amending the Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 - FY 2026 Bay County Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) to Revisions Per 2 CFR/200/Subpart E Cost Principle Guidelines

ORIGIN OF SUBJECT: Federal Government 2 CFR 200/Subpart E Cost Principles

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION NEEDED: None

BACKGROUND: The UPWP is a required product of the TPO. It describes the planning work tasks and budget for the TPO fiscal year (July through June). As defined in the Code of Federal Regulations, the UPWP is a statement of work identifying the planning priorities and activities to be carried out within a metropolitan planning area. At a minimum, a UPWP includes a description of the planning work and resulting products, who will perform the work, and the source(s) of funds (23 C.F.F. 450.104). The TPO adopts a new UPWP every other year along with an annual revision at the end of the first year.

TPO work elements include, but are not limited to:

- Program Development
- Long Range Transportation Planning
- Data Development and Management
- Short Range Transportation Planning
- Plans and Studies
- Public Involvement

Funding sources for these work elements include, but are not limited to:

- PL (Planning)
- CM (Congestion Management)

In October 2021, the TPO adopted the Federal 10% De Minimis indirect rate. This rate was used when calculating the budgets for the FY 2025 – FY 2026, which was adopted by Resolution FL-AL 24-15, during the April 2024 TPO meeting. Since this time, the Federal Government has changed the De Minimis allowance to 15% per 2 CFR 200/subpart E Cost Principles. Staff are recommending that the TPO officially adopt this new rate and cost principal guidance based upon 2 CFR 200/subpart E. This will allow staff to inform the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) and Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) so the process to make necessary UPWP budgetary changes, as applicable to the funding sources listed above, can begin.

The Financial Agreement between the TPO and FDOT will need to be amended, it is requested that the new De Minimis rate of 15% become effective January 1, 2025.

WHEREAS, the Bay County Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the organization designated by the governor of Florida as being responsible, together with the State of Florida for carrying out the continuing, cooperative and comprehensive transportation planning process for the Bay TPO planning area; and

WHEREAS, the Bay County TPO FY 2025 – FY 2026 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), which outlines tasks and their associated budgets for a determined time period, was adopted by the TPO in April 2024 and submitted to the governor of the State of Florida and to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), as provided in Title 23 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Section 450; Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, in October 2021, the TPO adopted the Federal 10% De Minimis indirect rate, which was used when calculating the budgets for the FY 2025 – FY 2026 UPWPs; and

WHEREAS, in October 2024 the federal government changed the De Minimis allowance to 15% per 2 CFR 200/subpart E;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BAY COUNTY TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION THAT:

The TPO amends the FY 2025 – FY 2026 Unified Planning Work Program to follow 2 CFR 200/subpart E cost principle guidelines including 15% De Minimis effective January 1, 2025.

ORIGIN OF SUBJECT: FHWA and FDOT

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION NEEDED: None

BACKGROUND: The Adjusted Urban Area Boundary Map is used to establish the boundary between urban and rural areas for Federal Highway Functional Classification purposes and is reviewed every 10 years as part of the Census. It is based on FHWA's "Highway Functional Classification Concepts, Criteria and Procedures" 2013 Edition. The Adjusted Urban Area Boundary and the Federal Classification Maps are to be reviewed by FDOT by December 2024 and approved by FWHA by April 2025.

The attached Urban Area Boundary Maps illustrate the differences between the 2010 and 2020 Census. The attached Federal Functional Classification Map for Bay County has been developed by FDOT with input from the TPO and local governments. Listed below are the proposed changes from 2010 to 2020 for the Federal Functional Classification.






2010 Adjusted Urban Area Boundary

Federal Functional Classification Definitions

<u>Arterials</u> – Arterial system provides the highest level of mobility at the highest speed, for long, uninterrupted travel. Arterials generally have higher design standards than other roads, often with multiple lanes and some degree of access control.

<u>Interstates</u> – Interstates are the highest classification of Arterials and were designed and constructed with mobility and long-distance travel in mind. Since inception the Interstate System has provided a superior network of limited access, divided highways offering high levels of mobility while linking the major urban areas of the United States. Federal Aid Eligible.

<u>Other Principal Arterials</u> – These roadways serve major centers of metropolitan areas, provide a high degree of mobility and can also provide mobility through rural areas. Unlike their access- controlled counterparts, abutting land uses can be served directly. Federal Aid Eligible.

<u>Minor Arterials</u> – Minor Arterials provide service for trips of moderate length, serve geographic areas that are smaller than their higher Arterial counterparts and offer connectivity to the higher Arterial system. Federal Aid Eligible.

<u>Collectors</u> – Collectors provide a lower degree of mobility than arterials. They are designed for travel at lower speeds and for shorter distances. Collectors are typically two-lane roads that collect and distribute traffic from the arterial system. In order to bridge this gap, Collectors must and do provide access to residential neighborhoods.

<u>Major Collectors</u> – Major Collector routes are longer in length; have lower connecting driveway densities; have higher speed limits; have higher annual average traffic volumes; than their Minor Collector counterparts. Federal Aid Eligible.

<u>Minor Collectors</u> – Minor collectors provide service to smaller communities not served by a higher class facility. These routes connect major thoroughfares to diffused areas, such areas include the primary connection to a farming area consisting of large acreage tracts or scattered small residential developments. These roads that are outside of the urban boundary are classed as Rural Minor Collectors. However, these roads that are inside the urban boundary are classed as Urban Minor Collectors. Urban Minor Collectors are Federal Aid Eligible. Rural Minor Collectors are Non-Federal Aid Eligible.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION NEEDED: Review and comment for consistency with local comprehensive plans.

BACKGROUND: At the June 5th meeting, the TPO adopted its FY 2026-2030 Project Priorities. The purpose of the Priorities is to ensure that projects programmed by FDOT in the Five-Year Work Program are consistent with local needs and plans. The Priorities rank projects in the following categories:

- 1. Long Range Transportation Plan Capacity Projects
- 2. Transportation Systems Management Projects
- 3. Transportation Alternative Projects
- 4. Public Transportation Projects
- 5. Aviation Projects
- 6. Seaport Projects

Adoption of the Project Priorities is the initial step in development of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). FDOT uses the Priorities to develop its Five-Year Work Program within system maintenance requirements and funds available in various funding categories.

FDOT presented a virtual (online) and in-person public hearing for the FY 2026-2030 Tentative Work Program on December 5, 2024. FDOT District III officials will present the FY 2026-2030 Tentative Work Program at the TPO meeting and will refine the Work Program and budgetary limitations to reflect the recommendations of the TPO. The proposed Work Program will then be submitted to the Florida Legislature to consider for adoption. The TPO will develop the final FY 2026-2030 TIP and will request adoption at the June 2025 TPO meeting, resulting in a TIP and FDOT Work Program that will be consistent.

The FY 2026-2030 Tentative Five-Year Work Program for Bay County will be distributed at the TPO, TCC, and CAC meetings.

ORIGIN OF SUBJECT: Federal Transportation Legislation Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21), Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, and Infrastructure Investment and Job Act (IIJA), Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), and Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT)

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION NEEDED: None

BACKGROUND: Transportation Planning Organizations (TPOs) are required to adopt targets for Safety Performance Measures annually, by February 27. The TPOs can either accept the Department of Transportation (DOT) targets or establish their own targets. From 2018 - 2023, the Bay County TPO accepted the FDOT targets for Safety Performance Measures through adoption of resolutions. The necessary language for Safety Performance Measures was incorporated each year into the adopted Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs) and/or by amendments to the TIP. Any future amendments to the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan will also need to incorporate language for Performance Measures. Because of these previous TPO actions, Resolution Bay 24-19 has been worded to continue with the state targets for safety as it needs to be adopted by February 27, 2025.

If a TPO agrees to support a State Highway Improvement Program Target, the TPO would:

- Work with state and safety stakeholders to address areas of concern for fatalities or serious injuries within the metropolitan planning area.
- Coordinate with the State and include the safety performance measures and the State's Highway Improvement Program targets for those measures in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan.
- Integrate into the metropolitan transportation planning process, the safety goals, objectives, performance measures and targets described in other State safety transportation plans and processes such as applicable portions of the Highway Safety Improvement Program, including the Strategic Highway Safety Plan.
- Include a description in the Transportation Improvement Program of the anticipated effect
 of the Transportation Improvement Program toward achieving Highway Safety Improvement
 Program targets in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan, linking investment priorities in the
 Transportation Improvement Program to those safety targets.

If a TPO establishes its own Safety Performance Target, the TPO would:

- Establish Highway Safety Improvement Program targets for all public roads in the metropolitan planning area in coordination with the State.
- Estimate vehicle miles traveled (VMT) for all public roads within the metropolitan planning area for rate targets.
- Coordinate with the state and include the safety performance measures and the TPO's safety targets for those measures in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan.
- Integrate into the metropolitan transportation planning process, the safety goals, objectives, performance measures and targets described in other State safety transportation plans and processes such as applicable portions of the Highway Safety Improvement Program,

- including the Strategic Highway Safety Plan.
- Include a description in the Transportation Improvement Program of the anticipated effect of the Transportation Improvement Program toward achieving Highway Safety Improvement Program targets in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan, linking investment priorities in the Transportation Improvement Program to those safety targets.

FDOT has adopted a "Vision Zero" target for the five safety measures. This "Vision Zero" target is based on the Florida Strategic Highway Safety Plan. The table below illustrates the targets the TPO adopted from 2018 - 2024 as well as FDOT targets for 2025. The targets are based on a five-year rolling average: 2018 (2012-2016), 2019 (2013-2017), 2020 (2014-2018), 2021 (2015-2019), 2022 (2016-2020, 2023 (2017-2021), 2024 (2018-2022), and 2025 (2019-2023). However, please note the 2025 five year rolling average has not yet been made available by FDOT.

FDOT'S METHODOLOGY

Florida shares the national traffic safety vision "Toward Zero Deaths," and formally adopted its own version of the national vision, "Driving Down Fatalities." FDOT is committed to eliminating fatalities and reducing serious injuries with the understanding that the death of any person is unacceptable and based on that, zero deaths is the FDOT safety performance target. This target is consistent throughout the FDOT Strategic Highway Safety Plan, Highway Safety Improvement Program and Highway Safety Plan.

Number of Fatalities

Based on statistical forecasting, the five-year rolling average for total fatalities on Florida's roads was forecasted to be 3,441.8 in 2023. Florida's target for fatalities is zero in 2025. The data forecast

indicates Florida's five-year rolling average for fatalities will continue to trend downward. The FDOT State Safety Office expects the projects chosen for funding will enhance this downward trend in the number of traffic fatalities on Florida's roads.

Number of Serious Injuries

Based on statistical forecasting, the five-year rolling average for serious injuries on Florida's roads was forecasted to be 16,380.6 in 2023. Florida's target for serious injuries is zero in 2025. The data forecast indicates Florida's five-year rolling average of serious injuries will continue to trend downward. The FDOT State Office expects the projects chosen for funding will enhance this downward trend in the number of serious injuries on Florida's roads.

Fatality Rate

Based on statistical forecasting, the five-year rolling average for fatality rate per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled on Florida's roads was forecasted to be 1,543 in 2023. Florida's target for fatality rate per 100 million vehicle miles traveled is zero in 2025. The data forecast indicates Florida's five-year rolling average of fatality rate per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled will continue to trend downward. The FDOT State Safety Office expects the projects chosen for funding will enhance this downward trend in the fatality rate per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled on Florida's roads.

Serious Injury Rate

Based on statistical forecasting, the five-year rolling average for serious injury rate per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled on Florida's roads was forecasted to be 7,344 in 2023. Florida's target for serious injury rate per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled is zero in 2025. The data forecast indicates Florida's serious injury rate per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled will continue to trend downward. The FDOT State Safety Office expects the projects chosen for funding will enhance this downward trend in the number of serious injuries per 100 million Vehicles Miles Traveled on Florida's roads.

Total Number of Non-Motorized Fatalities and Serious Injuries

Based on statistical forecasting, the five-year rolling average for the number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries on Florida's roads was forecasted to be 3,148.2 in 2023. Florida's target for number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries is zero in 2025. The data forecast indicates Florida's number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries will continue to trend downward. The FDOT State Safety Office expects the projects chosen for funding will enhance this downward trend in the number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries on Florida's roads.

ORIGIN OF SUBJECT: Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Task 3: Data Development and Management

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION NEEDED: None

BACKGROUND: The purpose of the CMPP is to identify, monitor, and rate the performance of transportation facilities (roadways, bike lanes, sidewalks, and transit services) and to suggest strategies for managing demand and encouraging commuting alternatives and low-cost, short-term actions to alleviate congestion. The CMPP is a tool used to evaluate the performance of transportation facilities by identifying where congestion exists.

The CMPP major update takes place every five years to coincide with the LRTP update. The last major update was in 2020 and can be found at www.ecrc.org/bay2045LRTP. The CMPP reviews specific strategies and projects (such as congested areas and corridors) as a part of the overall identification of opportunities for process improvement.

A minor update takes place on an annual basis and is documented through the CMPP minor update report to coordinate its implementation with TIP development. The annual minor CMPP update reflects the accomplishments in terms of congestion mitigation expected by the TPO by evaluating performance measures and Level of Service (LOS) tables. FDOT publishes the annual LOS metrics at D3 Level of Service via interactive map and exportable tables. Performance Measures Tracking (Appendix C) is also updated annually as part of the minor CMPP update.

WHEREAS, Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act Section 1201 134(k)(3)(a) requires that TMAs address congestion management through a process that provides for effective management and operation, based on a cooperatively developed and implemented metropolitan-wide strategy of new and existing transportation facilities eligible for funding under this chapter and title 23 through the use of travel demand reduction, job access projects, and operational management strategies; and

WHEREAS, although the Bay County TPO area is not a designated TMA, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) policy extends this requirement to all Metropolitan Planning Organizations to emphasize mobility management; and

WHEREAS, the Congestion Management Process Plan (CMPP) is considered a fully operational management system plan; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the CMPP is to rate the performance of transportation facilities and suggest low-cost and short-term strategies to alleviate congestion; and

WHEREAS, the CMPP requires an annual minor update which entails evaluating performance measures and level of service (LOS) ratings for all segments of the CMPP network;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BAY COUNTY TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION THAT:

The 2024 Congestion Management Process Plan minor update is hereby adopted.

The Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside provides funding for programs and projects consistent with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. 



RE: Callaway Elementary School Safety Concerns/SR22 Capacity Improvements

Dear Secretary Gainer:

At the August Bay TPO meeting Mr. Mark McQueen, Bay County Superintendent of Schools, brought to our attention significant concerns related to student safety and traffic congestion along SR 22 in the vicinity of Callaway Elementary School. The School Board concerns have been summarized below.

- There has been tremendous growth in both Callaway and Callaway Elementary School. Nearly 600 students now attend the school. The school has improved from a D School to an A school in just two years. As housing growth in the area continues to increase, the school's improved grade will undoubtedly attract additional students.
- Due to budget limitations students living within two miles of the school are no longer provided bus services. This has increased the number of parent/guardian drop offs, which has contributed greatly to the safety issues and congestion along the SR22 corridor.
- Despite guidance to drop students off on school property many parents/guardians are choosing to drop their student off along SR22 right of way. In many cases this requires the student to cross the highway during this busy time of day which places an additional burden on both School Employees and Law Enforcement as they attempt to provide a safe environment beyond the school property.

- The SR22 corridor has been the top roadway capacity priority for the Bay TPO for more than 10 years. Unfortunately, this corridor remains unfunded for right of way acquisition and construction. Interim safety improvements are needed at the school's location until the SR22 capacity project can provide the more long-term improvements that are so desperately needed.
- The School Board encourages the Department to consider all potential pedestrian and cyclist improvements as part of the capacity project. Improvements such as a pedestrian overpass at the school and appropriate sidewalks and bike lanes are features that would greatly increase the safety for the students.

The Bay TPO respectfully requests a safety analysis in the vicinity of Callaway Elementary School, with considerations for both SR22 and Star Avenue. The School Board, City of Callaway and Bay County understand the solutions to improve the safety of the students may require coordination and improvements beyond the SR22 corridor. To that end, the TPO supports the prioritization of interim improvements identified in a future safety analysis in our annual project priority list.

Capacity improvements on SR22 from Tyndall Parkway to Star Avenue remain the top roadway priority for the Bay TPO. Last year a letter was sent requesting the Department look at opportunities to begin acquiring the necessary right of way along SR22. The Board specifically inquired about the possibility of incremental right of way acquisition, understanding the difficulty in programming the total right way estimate during a single Work Program development cycle. We are again requesting the Department consider this request, or any other opportunities that would advance the capacity improvements for this corridor.
